Biltmore Estate is a large private estate and tourist attraction in Asheville, North Carolina. You can take a tour of this famous mansion. Your admission includes a self-guided visit of the Biltmore House. Stroll through America's Largest Home® on a marked route, assisted by knowledgeable guides along the way. This tour takes 1.5 to 2 hours depending on your pace. You will drink in all the amazing architecture, art-work, and much more from the Gilded Age. This tour also includes a free visit to Antler Hill Village and Winery with free wine tastings.

Lake Tomahawk provides its users a place to play, walk, swim, gather, commune, and relax within a 16.3 acre parcel situated centrally in Black Mountain. The dam, which creates the lake itself, was constructed between 1933 and 1935. A walking trail, numerous facilities, and several structures are situated around the lake. The lake is fed by the Tomahawk Branch River and spans 8.9 acres. The Lakeview Center was constructed around 1932 and renovated circa 1975 and 2010; the building currently is 5,485 square feet.

Hiking

There are so many great hiking trails in and around Black Mountain, it will be hard to choose just one. Hiking has become one of the most popular things to do in Black Mountain due to its fantastic trails and breathtaking views. Here are some favorite hikes near Black Mountain and Asheville:

Mount Mitchell Trail

Highest peak east of the Rocky Mountains. Mount Mitchell State Park is located an hour drive or 8 miles, as the crow flies from Black Mountain. This is a relatively difficult 11-mile hike up the tallest mountain in the eastern United States. This hike is recommended for experienced hikers because of its length and sometimes very steep sections.

Chimney Rock Park Trails

The trails at Chimney Rock Park are very popular among people of all ages. Most trails are under 1-mile round trip, with the longest being 1.5 miles. The Hickory Nut Falls trail brings you to the bottom of a 400 ft waterfall with an amazing views of the surrounding mountains.

Craggy Gardens Trail

Craggy Gardens Trail is great for walkers or runners looking for a 2 mile loop with gorgeous views. This trail is perfect for children because it is easily accessible and very moderate terrain.

Grandfather Mountain

Be inspired by views from the Mile High Swinging Bridge, stand head and shoulders above the surrounding region and be awestruck by 360-degree views of mountain ridge after mountain ridge retreating to the horizon in the nature preserve with over 12 miles of Alpine hiking trails.

Golf

Black Mountain Golf Course

Black Mountain Golf Course is a unique, fun and down to earth golfing experience. Established back in 1929, the course is surrounded by some of North Carolina's most spectacular mountain views. The course is located in the heart of historic Black Mountain, just 17 miles east of Asheville. Check in at the pro shop, warm up your short game on the practice green, and enjoy a break at the turn or after the round at the Tap In Grill.

A little Black Mountain History

Black Mountain, originally called "Grey Eagle," was a tiny agrarian village in the Blue Ridge Mountains until the coming of the railroad in 1879, an event that changed the face of the community forever. Trains brought visitors from hotter climates to the cool mountain air. The Blue Ridge and Black Mountains quickly became a popular tourist destination. Inns and boarding houses sprang up to serve the new visitors, many of whom, when they discovered the haunting beauty of Black Mountain and the surrounding valleys and coves, decided to buy land and relocate to the Swannanoa Valley.
